1. Case Law

+++ HIGHER REGIONAL COURT OF FRANKFURT ON CONSENT TO ADVERTISEMENT NECESSARY FOR PARTICIPATION IN PRIZE DRAW +++

The Higher Regional Court of Frankfurt has ruled on the validity of the consent to receiving advertisements which a provider requires for a participation in a prize draw (file ref. 6 U 6/19). The court considers consent to receiving advertisement by eight different advertisers valid. However, the consent may be invalid if it includes advertisement by too many different advertisers, so that the consenting person is likely not going to give attention to all companies and their business areas.

+++ ADMINISTRATIVE COURT OF BAVARIA ISSUES ORDER ON THE RESTRICTIONS OF A POLICE REQUEST FOR INFORMATION FROM AN ONLINE SERVICE PROVIDER +++

The Administrative Court of Bavaria dealt with a case on the legality of a police request to the operator of an online platform to disclose data on the platform users (file ref. 12 ZB 19.333). Such a request for information cannot be made without any tangible reason or occasion, but must be based on an adequate factual basis of the individual case and a relevant legal basis. The platform operator must and may only disclose information if the authority can refer to such a relevant basis.

+++ HIGHER REGIONAL COURT OF DUSSELDORF SUSPENDS FEDERAL CARTEL OFFICE'S ORDER IMPOSED ON FACEBOOK FOR DATA PROTECTION INFRINGEMENTS +++

The Higher Regional Court of Dusseldorf questioned the lawfulness of German Cartel Office's decision imposing on Facebook to merge user data – collected through different services of the Facebook group as well as through services of third parties – only

with the user's consent. Because of these doubts, the court has ordered that Facebook's appeal against the decision shall have the effect of suspending the decision (file ref. VI-Kart 1/19 (V)).

+++ DECISION OF THE FEDERAL ADMINISTRATIVE COURT ON RESPONSIBILITY OF OPERATORS OF A FACEBOOK FANPAGE IN TERMS OF DATA PRIVACY +++

The Federal Administrative Court has recently ruled on an official decision to prohibit the operation of a Facebook fan page due to the unlawful processing of user data (file ref. 6 C 15.18). Previously, the court had submitted several questions related to the case to the European Court of Justice, who decided that the operator of a fan page is in principle (together with Facebook) responsible for the data processing relating to the Facebook fan page (Case C-210/16 – "Wirtschaftsakademie Schleswig-Holstein"). Based hereupon, the Federal Administrative Court ruled that the operator of the fan page is responsible for unlawful data processing which takes place during the initial accessing of the fan page and that the supervisory authorities may take measures against the operator if such data processing is indeed unlawful. Whether this data processing is unlawful, is to be determined by the lower courts.

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2. Regulatory investigations and enforcement actions

+++ QUESTIONNAIRE BY THE DATA PROTECTION AUTHORITY OF LOWER SAXONY TO MONITOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE GDPR, AND SIMILAR CHECKS BY THE SUPERVISORY AUTHORITY OF BAVARIA +++

The data protection authority of the State of Lower Saxony currently verifies whether the GDPR has been duly implemented in 50 companies with headquarters in Lower Saxony, based on a questionnaire filled out by the companies. The authority has published the questionnaire including the key criteria based on which it is going to examine the information provided.

Also, the supervisory authority of Bavaria initiated checks monitoring the implementation of the GDPR at the end of 2018, especially in small and medium-sized enterprises, having sent a question-naire to 15 small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs). As of now, the Bavarian data protection authority has not yet fully evaluated the information provided, and has not yet determined further steps such as on-the-spot inspections.

The French data protection authority, CNIL, has updated its 2013 guidelines on the use of cookies and other tracking technologies, especially with regards to the conditions under which the use of tracking tools (including cookies for statistical analyses) is lawful and to the requirements which consent of the user must meet to comply with the GDPR.
